

Graduating Student Survey

Spring 2022

Executive Summary

Purpose:

The Graduating Student Survey was designed to gather opinions of graduating students related to various components of the educational experience at the University of South Alabama and their post-graduation plans. The Graduating Student Survey was conducted electronically using the Qualtrics survey system. It included Likert scale, multiple choice, and open-ended questions. Participation was voluntary and reminder emails were sent to non-respondents every three days before the close of the survey.

What is in the summary?

The following summary outlines strengths, areas of improvement, activities students may be interested in after graduating, and how students would like to be contacted as alumni.

Scoring, Interpretation, and Rationale

- Items with 80% or more positive responses (agree or strongly agree) are considered strengths. This is because 80% indicates scoring at least a "B" on these items.
- Items with more than 20% negative responses (disagree or strongly disagree) are considered areas of potential improvement. This is because these items have lower than 80% positive responses, indicating a "C" or lower.

Highlights

- 96% of the respondents said that library resources were sufficient to meet their needs
- 82% of students reported feeling safe while on campus
- 87% of students agreed that being in a student organization added value to their experience as a student at USA

Sample: The sample consisted of students who were graduating in the Spring 2022 semester. In total, there were 1,600 graduating students; 659 students responded to the survey for a response rate of 41%. N = number of respondents. Of these respondents, approximately 71% are female and 32% are minorities. Respondent demographics are shown below.

Key Findings - Strengths

- More than 97% of students planning to start a new job after graduation said that their major or field prepared them for the new position.
- About 86% agreed that the information their advisor provided about graduation requirements was accurate.
- Approximately 81% said they had adequate access to their advisor.
- Of students who have had experience with Career Services, more than **96%** were satisfied with their services.
- About 96% agreed that library resources were sufficient to meet their needs.
- About 82% felt the variety of electives available within their major were sufficient.
- Approximately 89% agreed that, in general, faculty were interested in their academic success.
- About 91% agreed that faculty were accessible outside of class.
- Over 93% felt the coursework for their program was challenging
- About 86% of students felt there was ample opportunity to apply what they were learning to real-world problems or jobs.
- More than 89% of graduate students agreed that their thesis/dissertation advisor encouraged their intellectual growth and curiosity.
- Approximately 87% agreed that being involved in a student organization added value to their experience as a student at USA.
- If given the opportunity to do it over again, almost **83%** of students said they would still choose to attend USA.

Key Findings – Areas of Potential Improvement

- About 23% of students felt there was not enough opportunity to work with faculty on research outside of class.
- Nearly 24% of students received incorrect information from their advisor regarding general education requirements
- Less than **10%** of students reported visiting the office of Career Services in the past year.
- Approximately 28% of students felt the frequency with which they met their advisor was insufficient.
- Over 21% felt that there was not enough opportunity to take part in service-learning.
- About 26% of students are graduating later than they thought they would.

Opportunities – Staying Connected After Graduation

- Students reported that, as alumni, they would like to participate in the following activities: Tailgates and football games (27%); concerts and exhibitions on campus at a discount (22%); concerts and exhibitions around town at a discount (25%); and through mentoring current students (19%)
- Over 53% of students agreed the best way for USA to keep in touch with them is through email
